Read carefully the notes for classes you intend to enter, there are notes as to how/what to exhibit.

If you have any doubts or queries then ask the relevant steward or show registrar.

Collections should be similar in size if possible.

Remove any faded or damaged petals or leaves on flowers.

Children's ages should be put on the entry card. Children may also enter adult classes, but will be judged alongside adult competitors.

Recycling jam jars is encouraged, but should be filled to within half an inch of top and not have additional cloth covers.

Please remember to fill in your entry cards before staging.

Up to 3 entries per class are allowed, but must all be different/varieties.

Exhibitors who have entered in National Shows may not enter in those classes. This includes professional crafters.

Floral Art—flowers need not have been grown by the exhibitor, there are no height restrictions unless stated. Arrangements will not be judged under the rules of NAFAS

7. DOUBLE DAFFODILS/NARCISSI, three stems of one variety.
8. TULIPS, three stems of one variety.
9. TULIPS, four, one or more varieties.
10. TULIPS, grown in a pot, bowl or pan.
11. HYACINTHS, grown in a bowl, at least three of one variety.
12. BULBS OR CORMS, grown in a pot, bowl or pan.
13. PRIMULAS, POLYANTHUS, PRIMROSES, three stalks of one variety, not auriculas.
14. AURICULA, one plant in a pot.
15. PANSIES, five blooms in a saucer of sand, one variety.
16. VIOLAS, five blooms in a saucer of sand, one variety.
17. POT PLANT, flowering, (not orchid) pot not exceeding 25cms.
18. POT PLANT, grown for foliage, pot not exceeding 25 cms.
19. HELLEBORUS, a display of flower heads, floating in a shallow 8"/20 cm dia bowl of water one or more varieties.
20. ANY OTHER SPRING FLOWER, three stems of one variety.

Trumpet daffodils have trumpets longer than their petals. Large cup narcissi have cups between half and the full length of their petals. Small cup narcissi have cups less than a third of their petals. Pot sizes are internal.

Mary Berry Coffee Cake—SUMMER SHOW

- 100g (3.5oz) unsalted softened butter
- 100g (3.5oz) caster sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 100g (3.5ozs) self raising flour
- 1 level tsp baking powder
- 50g (1.75oz) chopped walnuts
- 1 tbsp coffee essence

Filling/topping -

- 75g (2.75oz) unsalted softened butter
- 225g (8oz) sifted icing sugar
- 2 tbsps. milk
- 2 tsp coffee essence
- 8 walnut halves to decorate

Preheat oven to Gas 4, 350F, 180C or 160C fan. Use centre of oven.

Lightly butter 2 loose bottom 18cm(7in) baking tins and line with parchment.

Combine butter, sugar, eggs, baking powder, chopped walnuts and coffee essence until smooth.

Divide between the 2 tins and bake for 20– 25 mins. Leave to cool.

For filling and topping beat butter and icing sugar. Add milk and coffee essence and beat until smooth.

Sandwich cakes together with half the mixture. Spread the second half on top and

decorate with the walnut halves.

RECIPE FOR VICTORIA SANDWICH –SUMMER SHOW –GENTLEMEN ONLY

- 175g caster sugar + extra for decorating
- 175g soft margarine or butter
- 175g self raising flour
- 3 eggs
- Raspberry jam

Preheat oven to Gas 4, 350F, 180C or 160C fan. Use centre of oven.

Grease 2 x 20cm (8in) sandwich tins, line with parchment.

Place sugar, margarine or butter in bowl, beat together and continue until light and fluffy.

Add eggs one at a time, beating well and adding 1 tsp flour after each egg to prevent curdling.

Sift flour over mixture and fold in gently until smooth.

Divide the mixture between prepared tins and spread evenly.

Place in centre of oven and bake for 20-30 mins or until risen and springy when gently pressed. Push cocktail stick into centre, if it comes out clean, its ready.

Leave to cool in tins for 5 mins, then loosen edges and turn onto cooling rack. Peel off lining paper and leave to cool completely.

Sandwich together with jam and dust with caster sugar.

Apple and Cheese Tea Bread—AUTUMN SHOW

- 100g (4oz) softened butter or soft margarine
- 100g (4oz) caster sugar
- 250g (10oz) plain white flour
- 1 level tsp baking powder
- 2 large eggs, beaten
- 1 level tsp salt
- 75g (3oz) strong cheddar cheese, grated
- 450g (1lb) cooking apple, peeled and grated (wait until last minute to do this)

Grease and line the base of a 900g (2lb) loaf tin.

Cream the butter and sugar in a large bowl until light and fluffy.

Beat the eggs into the mixture.

Add the baking powder and salt to the flour and fold into the mixture.

Add the cheese and apples and mix well.

Spoon the mixture into the tin and level the surface.

Bake for approx 1 hour at gas mark 4, 350F, 180C, 170C fan oven.

The cake should be firm, well risen and starting to shrink away from the sides.

Allow to cool in the tin for a few minutes then turn out and leave to cool completely on a wire rack.

16. VEGETABLE MARROWS, max length 350 mm, one.
17. BEETROOT, 75 mm leafstalk, two.
18. CARROTS, any variety, not more than 75 mm leafstalk, two.
19. CUCUMBER, any variety, one.
20. CABBAGE, one.

SUMMER SHOW

21. LETTUCE, hearted, one.
22. LETTUCE, loose, one.
23. COURGETTES, flowers removed, max length 20 cm, two.
24. RHUBARB, foliage to be cut to leave 75 mm from start to stalk, budscapes at bottom of stalk removed, two sticks.
25. A SALAD BOWL three kinds displayed, max 20cm (8 in) bowl.
26. ANY OTHER VEGETABLE, not eligible for the above classes, please ask for quantities required.
27. CULINARY HERBS, at least 5 different kinds, labelled and displayed as you wish.
28. RHUBARB, longest stick, foliage to be cut and scales removed as class 24.

SHOW RULES

The Ramsbury Horticultural Society is associated with the Royal Horticultural Society.

The Society's Shows will be conducted in accordance with the rules and standards contained in the RHS's Show Handbook, except where, under the schedule, they obviously do not apply.

1 Exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor. All flowers, fruit and vegetables must either have been grown by the exhibitor, or have been in their possession for at least 2 months. Produce from an employers garden must be entered in the employers name.

All exhibits in the HOME INDUSTRIES, ARTS AND CRAFTS AND PHOTOGRAPHY sections must have been made by the exhibitor and must not have been previously shown in a show organised by the society.

2 Collections/unspecified vegetable and fruit classes. The number of each kind of vegetable or fruit should be set out in the individual classes. Where exhibitors wish to enter a kind of vegetable or fruit not listed in the individual classes, reference should be made to the Show Secretary who will agree the numbers to be shown.

3 Exhibitors should provide a plate, tray, basket, glass, vase or other suitable receptable for exhibits. Vegetables must be clean and outer leaves should be removed. Exhibitors are reminded that care in display not only improves the look of the show, but may also help the in the competition.

4 Exhibitors are allowed to enter a maximum of 3 exhibits in classes, but the exhibits must be different from one another. i.e of a different variety or type.

5 An exhibit will be disqualified (a) if it does not contain the exact number of specimens called for in the schedule; (b) if it is not in the particular type of receptacle specified and if any of the points in Rule 1 or 4 are not adhered to.

6 The committee shall have the power to decide whether an exhibitor is eligible to enter any particular class. It also reserves the right to inspect the garden or allotment of an exhibitor, or may authorise the judges to make such an inspection.

7 Trophies in adult classes will only be awarded to paid up members of the Society. Members living outside the area of the Whitton Benefice (Ramsbury, Axford, Baydon, Aldbourne, Chilton Foliat and Froxfield) will be awarded Certificates instead of taking trophies out of the area. Their names will be engraved on the trophies won and they will

be held by the society.

8 Employed – Self Employed Gardeners who reside with the Whitton Benefice MAY enter the shows but the employers name must be displayed as per Rule 1 or listed as own allotment / garden.

Professional Exhibitors those who enter into Shows larger than Ramsbury Horticultural Society & Commercial Nurserymen, those who grow plants on masse for financial reward may NOT enter into those classes. Example Dahlia Exhibitor or Grower may NOT enter into ANY Dahlia Class.

9 Judging. The judges shall have the power to withhold any prize if, in their opinion, there is insufficient merit. They may also award a prize(or card) to any deserving exhibit in excess of the prize authorised by the schedule.

10 Loss or damage. All exhibits, personal property etc, shall be displayed at the risk of the exhibitor and the society shall not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.

11 Protests. Any protest must be made in writing and delivered to the show secretary before 3pm on the day of the show. A deposit of £2 must be made with the protest and this will be refunded if the protest is upheld or at the discretion of the Committee.

12 The show committee's decision is final.
