#### **SHOW RULES**

## The Ramsbury Horticultural Society is associated with the Royal Horticultural Society.

The Society's Shows will be conducted in accordance with the rules and standards contained in the RHS's Show Handbook, except where, under the schedule, they obviously do not apply.

**1 Exhibits** must be the property of the exhibitor. All flowers, fruit and vegetables must either have been grown by the exhibitor, or have been in their possession for at least 2 months. Produce from an employers garden must be entered in the employers name.

All exhibits in the HOME INDUSTRIES, ARTS AND CRAFTS AND PHOTOGRAPHY sections must have been made by the exhibitor and must not have been previously shown in a show organised by the society.

- **2 Collections/unspecified vegetable and fruit classes.** The number of each kind of vegetable or fruit should be set out in the individual classes. Where exhibitors wish to enter a kind of vegetable or fruit not listed in the individual classes, reference should be made to the Show Secretary who will agree the numbers to be shown.
- **3 Exhibitors** should provide a plate, tray, basket, glass, vase or other suitable receptable for exhibits. Vegetables must be clean and outer leaves should be removed. Exhibitors are reminded that care in display not only improves the look of the show, but may also help the in the competition.
- **4 Exhibitors** are allowed to enter a maximum of 3 exhibits in classes, but the exhibits must be different from one another. i.e of a different variety or type.
- **5** An exhibit will be disqualified (a) if it does not contain the exact number of specimens called for in the schedule; (b) if it is not in the particular type of receptacle specified and if any of the points in Rule 1 or 4 are not adhered to.
- **6 The committee** shall have the power to decide whether an exhibitor is eligible to enter any particular class. It also reserves the right to inspect the garden or allotment of an ex-

any particular class. It also reserves the right to inspect the garden or allotment of an exhibitor, or may authorise the judges to make such an inspection.

### 7 Trophies in adult classes will only be awarded to paid up members of the Society who live within the Whitton Benefice

- **8 Employed Self Employed** Gardeners who reside with the Whitton Benefice MAY enter the shows but the employers name must be displayed as per Rule 1 or listed as own allotment / garden. **Professional Exhibitors** those who enter into Shows larger than Ramsbury Horticultural Society & Commercial Nurserymen, those who grow plants en masse for financial reward may NOT enter into those classes. Example Dahlia Exhibitor or Grower may NOT enter into ANY Dahlia Class.
- **9 Judging.** The judges shall have the power to withhold any prize if, in their opinion, there is insufficient merit. They may also award a prize(or card) to any deserving exhibit in excess of the prize authorised by the schedule.
- **10** Loss or damage. All exhibits, personal property etc, shall be displayed at the risk of the exhibitor and the society shall not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.
- **11 Protests.** Any protest must be made in writing and delivered to the show secretary before 3pm on the day of the show. A deposit of £2 must be made with the protest and this will be refunded if the protest is upheld or at the discretion of the Committee.

### 12 The show committee's decision is final.

**13 Trophies.** Trophies are the responsibility of the winner from when they are engraved until being returned for the same show the following year.

### RECIPE FOR GINGER & ORANGE CAKE—CLASS 80

### **SUMMER SHOW**

100g (4oz) golden syrup 100g (4oz) black treacle

250 ml (9fl oz) water 100g (4oz) softened butter

100g (4oz) caster sugar grated rind of 1 orange

1 large egg, beaten 275g (10oz) plain flour

1 ½ level teaspoons bicarbonate of soda

1 level teaspoon ground cinnamon 1 level teaspoon ground ginger

For The Icing

100g (4oz) icing sugar Juice of 1 orange

- 1. Pre-heat oven Conventional 180 / Fan 160 / Gas 4 Grease a 23 cm (9in) deep round cake tin then line the base and slides with baking parchment.
- 2. Measure the golden syrup and treacle into a pan along with the water and bring to the boil. Meanwhile, put the remaining ingredients into the mixing bowl and beat well until thoroughly blended. Add the syrup and treacle mixture and beat again until smooth. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin.
- 3. Bake in the pre-heated oven for about 50 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin for 10 minutes then turn out, peel off the parchment and finish cooling on a wire rack.
- 4. To make the icing, sift the icing sugar into a bowl and add enough orange juice to make a smooth, fairly thick mixture. Stand the wire rack in a baking tray to catch any drips, then spoon the icing over the top of the cake and leave to set for about 1 hour.

IF possible store the cake for 2 days, wrapped in baking parchment and foil, BEFORE icing. This allows the cake to mature and become moist and sticky

### **RECIPE FOR ROCK BUNS – SUMMER SHOW CLASS 85**

### **GENTLEMEN ONLY**

225g/8oz softened butter or margarine

75 g/3oz caster sugar

1 egg

225 g/8oz self raising flour

1 level teaspoon baking powder

1 tablespoon milk

150g/5.5oz dried fruit

2 teaspoons vanilla essence

Preheat oven to 180C/fan 160c/gas 4.

Grease or line 2 baking trays.

Mix together flour, caster sugar and baking powder.

Rub the butter/margarine into the flour mixture either with your fingers or a fork, until mixture looks like fine breadcrumbs.

Stir in the dried fruit.

In a separate bowl beat the egg together with milk and vanilla essence.

Add this to the dry ingredients, mix with metal spoon to form thick dough.

Drop golf ball size spoonfuls onto baking trays, leaving room to spread.

Bake for 15 to 20 minutes.

Allow to firm up for a couple of minutes on trays then transfer to cooling racks.

Store in airtight container.

### RECIPE FOR YORKSHIRE FAT RASCALS—CLASS 63

#### **AUTUMN SHOW**

- 8oz/225g self-raising flour, sifted
- 1 teaspoon sweet mixed spices
- 3oz/75g caster sugar
- 4oz/113g unsalted butter, chilled and diced
- 5oz/125g mixed dried fruit
- 150ml/5 fl oz double cream, milk, or crème fresh
- I teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 beaten egg
- Ingredients for decoration (almonds and glace cherries)

### Preheat the oven to 200c, mark 6

- 1. Sift the flour and mixed spices into a mixing bowl and stir in the sugar
- 2. Rub in the butter until it resembles fine breadcrumbs
- 3. Stir in the dried fruit, then add the beaten egg, lemon juice, cream/milk and combine to form a sticky but firm dough
- 4. Divide the mixture into six equal parts
- 5. Pat them into generous rounds onto a greased baking tray
- 6. Decorate with glace cherries and almonds
- 7. Coat with milk and bake for 20 minutes or so until golden brown and firm.

When cold, split and butter.

- 18. **CABBAGE**, one.
- 19. **LETTUCE**, hearted, one, can be displayed in water.
- 20. **LETTUCE**, loose, one, can be displayed in water.
- 21. **COURGETTES**, flowers removed, max length 20 cm, two.


- 22. **RHUBARB**, foliage to be cut to leave 75 mm from start of stalk, bud scales at bottom of stalk removed, two sticks.
